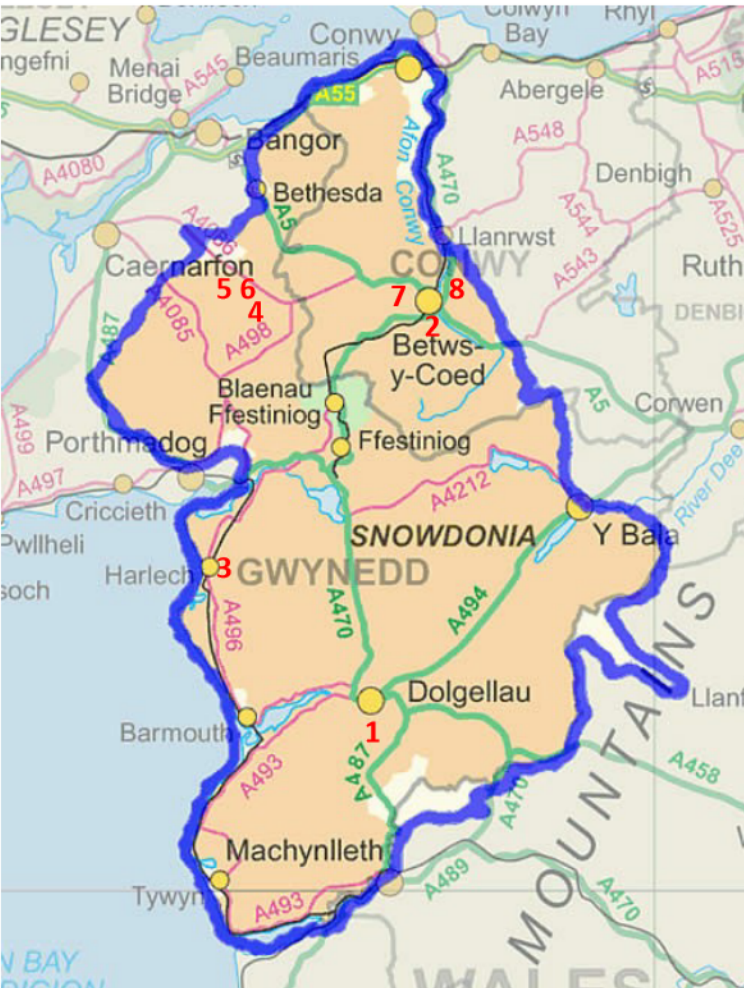




Betwys y Coed

Gateway to Snowdonia

Betws-y-Coed is the principal village of the Snowdonia National Park. Covering more than 800 square miles, the park is a region of haunting beauty and grandeur, of wild rocky mountains, hidden valleys, cascading rivers, still glacial lakes and deep forests.



Snowdonia National Park

Cader Idris

The second most-popular mountain in Wales. It is actually a ridge, 6.5 miles long, at the southern end of the Snowdonia National Park. The summit itself is called Pen y Gadair and is 2930 ft high. There are a number of approaches to the summit.



Harlech Castle

A medieval fortification, constructed atop a spur of rock close to the Irish Sea. It was built by Edward I during his invasion of Wales between 1282 and 1289 at the substantial cost of £8,190 !



National Slate Museum

Explore the history of slate, the traditional craft of the quarryman, in authentic workshops - complete with steam train, industrial machinery and slate-splitting demonstrations.



Swallow Falls

This waterfall on the Afon Llugwy has become a familiar natural celebrity over the past 100 years and has featured on film, postcard and canvas. While its principal viewpoints are situated on the south bank, it is observed far more dramatically if approached on foot along the northern bank.



Fairy Glen

A secluded gorge and beauty spot on the Conwy River. Just off the A470, near the intersection with the A5 - there is a small car park nearby - turn left just after the Fairy Glen Hotel and it's reached down a small track. You then have to walk 15 minutes to get to Fairy Glen itself.



Mount Snowdon

The highest mountain in Wales, at an elevation of 3,560 ft above sea level, and the highest point in the British Isles outside the Scottish Highlands. It is located in Snowdonia National Park in Gwynedd. Standing tall over the village of Llanberis, Snowdon is a part of a close-knit family of jagged peaks and can offer views of Snowdonia, Anglesey, Pembrokeshire and Ireland.



Snowdon Mountain Railway

Take the journey of a lifetime to the rooftop of Wales. Snowdon, at 3560 feet dominates the landscape of the Snowdonia National Park in North Wales. From the first views of the waterfall plunging into the gorge below at the start of the journey, to the breath-taking sights from the summit.



Zip World Fforest

Nestled in the spectacular Conwy Valley, Zip World Fforest offers an idyllic woodland setting for all your adventurous wishes. Enjoy a journey through the canopy of the trees on Zip Safari, bounce and explore to your hearts content on Treetop Nets or soar over the tree tops on the giant five seater swing, Skyride.
