



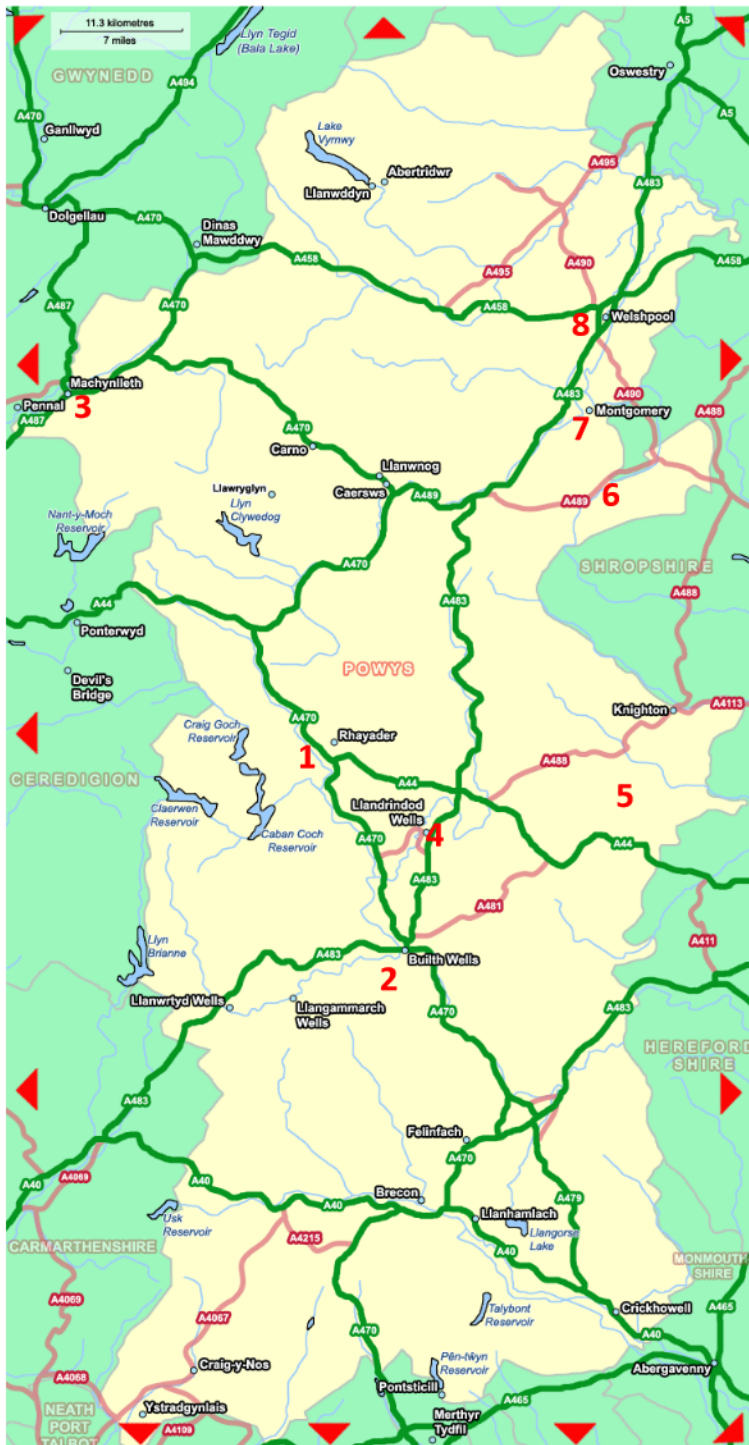
Llandrindod Wells

Powys

Llandrindod is the county seat of Powys, a principal area and local-government county and preserved county in Mid Wales. Powys is named after the successor Kingdom of Powys, which formed after the Romans withdrew from Britain.

Powys Attractions from Llandrindod

- 1. Elan Valley, Rhayader** - 10 miles west, man made lakes and wildlife.
- 2. Erwood Station Gallery, Builth Wells** 12 miles south, contemporary craft and arts.
- 3. Falconry Experience, Machynlleth** 12 miles west. Visitors by appointment only.
- 4. Hall at Abbey Cwm Hir, Llandrindod**, neo Elizabethan Country House.
- 5. Judges Lodging, Presteigne** 20 miles east. Hands on Victorian museum
- 6. Kerry Vale Vineyards, Churchstoke** 40 miles north. Small family vineyard
- 7. Montgomery Castle, Montgomery** 30 miles north. Restored 13th century ruin
- 8. Powis Castle, Welshpool** 37 miles north medieval castle, fortress and country mansion

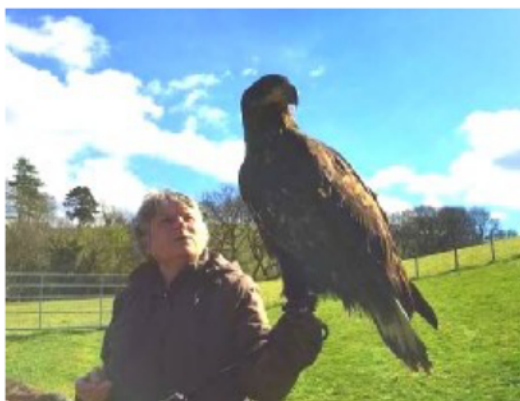

Montgomery Castle begun by Henry III in 1223 and given to Hubert de Burgh in 1228. Held by the Mortimers in the fourteenth century, it was later demolished on the order of Parliament after the Civil War.



Erwood Station Gallery showcases the very best in contemporary craft and applied arts in Wales and the Borders. Set in two thousand square feet of exhibition space housed within a railway station and 3 vintage carriages.



Hall at Abbey Cwm Hir Remodelled in 1869,

the Hall is one of Wales' most outstanding Victorian homes. A 52 room, listed property with magnificent architecture overlooking a ruined 900 year old Cistercian Abbey set in beautiful countryside.

Now, after 10 years of restoration, tours of the house and gardens are available.



Kerry Vale Vineyard a small, family run, English vineyard situated on the Welsh / English border. Planted in 2010 and covering six acres of farmland, on what was a Roman Fort, the vineyard resides at the eastern tip of the Vale of Kerry - an area of exceptional beauty.



Powis Castle & Garden, overhung with clipped yews, shelters rare and tender plants, it retains its original lead statues and an orangery on the terraces. High on a rock, the 13th century castle began life as a medieval fortress.
