Conwy Castle 4 miles south. Some say it is the most magnificent of Edward I's Welsh fortresses. To get the full picture, head for the battlements. Breathtaking views across mountains and sea. If the outside impresses (and it will), wait until you go in.



Great Orme Cable Car As the Llandudno Cable Cars glide silently from Happy Valley to the summit of the Great Orme, you can take in the jaw-dropping panoramic views of the Bay of Llandudno, the Little Orme, the Conwy Estuary and miles out over the Iris Sea. And then look down on the beautiful gardens of Happy Valley.



Great Orme Copper Mine Uncovered in 1987 the copper mines represent one of the most astounding archaeological discoveries of recent times. Dating back 4,000 years to the Bronze Age they change our views about the ancient people of Britain and their civilized and structured society, 2000 years before the Romans.



Llandudno Pier This "Queen of Welsh Piers" was completed in 1878 and remains one of the longest piers in Britain. At 2295 feet long, it retains all its Victorian elegance, featuring several Arcades, Concession stands and host frequent concerts.



Great Orme The Great Orme headland is a massive chunk of limestone rising 679ft straight out of the sea. Little wonder that its name, given by the Vikings, means 'sea monster'. It may be big and bold, but it's a friendly kind of place too, a long-standing Llandudno favorite.



Great Orme Tramway Britain's only cable-hauled public road tramway. It climbs a mile up the Great Orme Country Park with the unique journey beginning at Victoria Station, climbing to visit the Halfway Station exhibition, where you change trams and continue your journey to the Summit where the views are breath-taking!



Home Front Museum Experience the sights and sounds of civilian life during the Second World War. In this unique living history museum, take a self-guided tour and explore 6 years of war on the home front captured in shops, room displays and tableaux.



Promenade a traffic free walkway between the North Shore and Marine Drive, between the Great Orme and the Little Orme. It is home to the Town Theater, Bandstand, swimming pool and Conference Center. Several hotels overlook the Promenade
