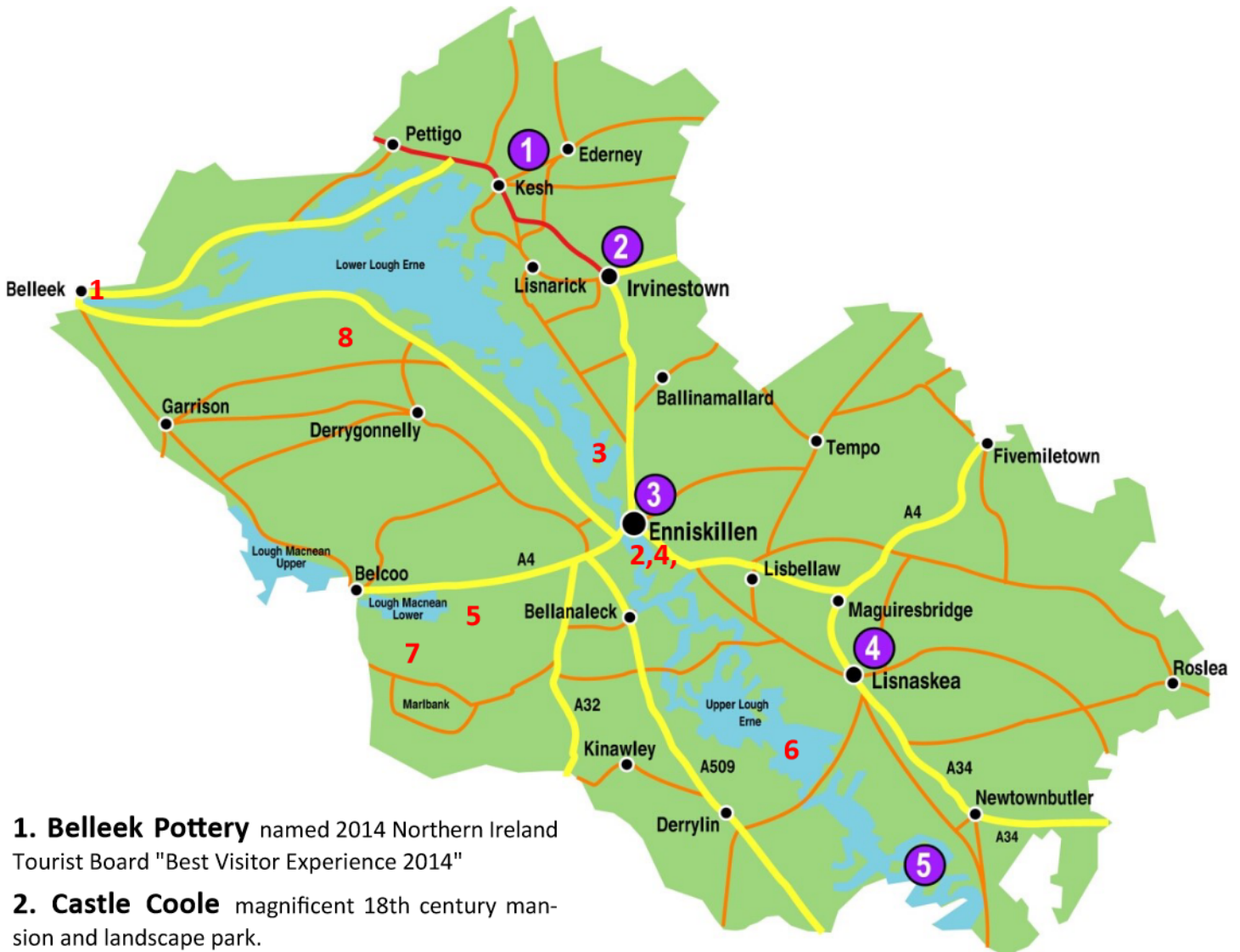




Enniskillen

“The heart of Ireland’s Lake District”

Located in the center of County Fermanagh, between Upper and Lower Lough Erne
2 hours driving from Belfast and 2.5 hours from Dublin
1/3 of the County is water, ideal for sailing and fresh water kayaking
Great scenery with many “hidden gems” to discover

2. Castle Coole magnificent 18th century mansion and landscape park.

3. Devenish Island 6th century monastic site, accessible only by ferry

4. Enniskillen Castle, 600 year old home to the Enniskillen Museums

5. Florence Court Forest Park with views across Fermanagh and beyond at its peak.

6. Lough Erne the second largest lake system in Ireland

7. Marble Arch Caves a UNESCO underground miracle of nature.

8. Navar Forest a spectacular 7 mile forest drive with great viewing points.

Belleek Pottery a step back in history. Our museum contains pieces dating back to when the pottery was started in 1857. Our guided tours begin from 10.15am until 12.15pm and resume from 2.00pm to 4.00pm and takes approximately 30 minutes and covers all of the production areas offering our guests the possibility of meeting and chatting with our craftspeople



Castle Coole encounter lavishly decorated rooms in early 19th century style, including the grand oval Saloon which is considered the focal point of the whole house. The tour also ventures up the beautiful 'imperial' staircase, where you can see the ornate State Bedroom, which was decorated for a visit of King George IV and rarely used, so it has stayed in fantastic condition. Devenish Island Monastic Site was founded in the 6th century by Saint Molaise on one of Lough Erne's many islands. During its history it has been raided by Vikings (837AD), burned (1157AD) and flourished (Middle Ages) as a parish church site and St Mary's Augustine Priory. Accessible only by boat from Troiry.



Enniskillen Castle Situated beside the River Erne in County Fermanagh, was built almost 600 years ago by the ruling Gaelic Maguires. Guarding one of the few passes into Ulster, it has been strategically important throughout its history. Today, the historic site houses two museums, Fermanagh County Museum and The Inniskillings Museum.



Florence Court Forest Park Surrounded by lush parkland and thick woodland enjoys a majestic countryside setting. There is something for everyone. Take a guided tour of the Georgian mansion. Outdoors take a gentle walk or long cycle along 10 miles of trails in the adjoining forest park and see fascinating industrial heritage features, including the water-powered sawmill and blacksmith's forge.



Lough Erne, both Upper and the larger Lower loughs are well worth exploring. Wonderful waterways and stunning landscape provide the stage for memorable experiences, fascinating landmarks and first class activities. Enjoy our crafts, our legends and traditions. Marble Arch Caves This Global Geopark a Unesco World Heritage site, is host to one of the finest show caves in Europe. Visitors are guided through a fascinating natural underworld of rivers, waterfalls, winding passages and lofty chambers while stunningly beautiful cave formations glisten all around.



Navar Forest rises to the top of the Magho cliffs and comprises over 2,600 hectares of primarily coniferous forest. There are spectacular views over Lower Lough Erne, Donegal Bay, the Blue Stack and Sperrin Mountains. The drive has been created to allow visitors to enjoy this scenery. Car parking facilities, picnic areas, viewpoints and short walks to interesting features have been provided.
