Blending centuries of history, is why the entire city was designated a World Heritage Site in 1987. Experience the magic of the 2000 year old Roman Baths, the elegance of the Georgian New Town, as you walk the World Heritage Site tour.

Not only a World Heritage site but also a perfect base from which to discover the treasures within a 50 mile radius, including the Cotswolds, Stonehenge and the impressive Cheddar Gorge in the Mendip Hills, not to mention historic Glastonbury, site of the first Christian church in England and believed to be the resting place of the Holy Grail.

## 1. Bath Abbey

For 1200 years, there is nowhere else quite like Bath Abbey. Magnificent stained-glass windows, columns of honey-gold stone and some of the finest fan vaulting in the world, create an extraordinary experience of light and space.



## 2. Fashion Museum

Housed in the magnificent Assembly Rooms, the Fashion Museum Bath holds a world-class collection of contemporary and historic dress. You'll see everything from historic Georgian gowns to cutting-edge fashion from leading designers.



## 3. Guildhall

Built in 1775, the Guildhall has been at the heart of Bath's administrative life for 350 years. As well as being a stunning location for all manner of corporate and private events, it continues to house the Register Office, Mayor's parlor and city archives.



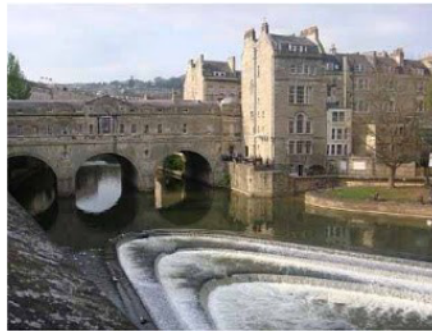
## 4. Jane Austen Centre

Offers a snapshot of what it would be like to live in the Regency times - the fashion, food, society - everything that would have inspired Austen's timeless novels. The Centre also explores how the city of Bath impacted upon Jane Austen's life



## 5. Pulteney Bridge

Designed by Robert Adam in 1769, one of the most photographed examples of Georgian architecture in the city and one of only four bridges in the world to have shops across its full span on both sides,



## 6. Pump Room

A restaurant in a historic building in the Abbey Church Yard. It is adjacent to the Roman Baths and is named for water that is pumped into the room from the baths' hot springs. Visitors can drink the water and other refreshments.



## 7. Roman Baths

Constructed around 70AD as a grand bathing and socialising complex, the Roman Baths is one of the best-preserved Roman remains in the world, where 31,000 gallons of steaming spring water, reaching 115°F, still fills the bathing site every day.



## 8. Royal Crescent

One of the greatest examples of Georgian architecture anywhere in the UK and an iconic landmark, built between 1767 and 1775. Arranged around a perfect lawn overlooking Royal Victoria Park forming a sweeping crescent of 30 Grade I Listed terrace houses.



## 9. Sally Lunn's

One of the oldest houses in Bath (c.1482) and serves one of the most famous local delicacies - the original Sally Lunn bun. According to legend, Sally Lunn, a French refugee, arrived in 1680 and established her bakery.



## 10. Thermae Bath Spa

A combination of the historic spa and a contemporary building re-opened in 2006. Owned by the city, as they are the guardians of the spring waters, which are the only naturally hot, mineral-rich waters in the UK.
