1. Brighton Beach

One of the top 10 city beaches in the world. Daytime seaside fun mixes seamlessly with night time funky beach side culture. Activities available include: kayaking, paddle boarding, volleyball and frisbee.

3. British Airways i360

Take to the skies to see Brighton and the beautiful south coast as you have never seen them before. Glide up gently to 450ft in the futuristic glass viewing pod, which was conceived and designed by the creators of the London Eye.

7. Royal Pavilion

An exotic palace in the centrer of Brighton with a colorful history. Built as a seaside pleasure palace for King George IV, this historic house mixes Regency grandeur with the visual style of India and China.



9. The Lanes

Once the hub of the original fishing town. At its heart lies a warren of narrow, twisting alleyways filled with independent jewellers and tiny antique shops. The Old Police Cells Museum, in the Town Hall's basement, offers free tours of a 200-year-old underground jail.



2. Brighton Museum & Art Gallery

Located in the Royal Pavilion garden, at the heart of the city's cultural quarter. Its diverse collections bring together the arts and history to tell stories about the city and the world we live in.



4. Devil's Dyke

Managed by the National Trust. Discover the history and myths as you walk the beautiful downland. Look out for earthworks and landscape features that hint as to how the land was shaped and how man created order and explanation from what sometimes seemed the inexplicable.



6. North Laine

Unique & Vibrant. Representing a colorful mixture of small and diverse shops and independent traders. Whatever you are looking for, you'll find it all here in the North Laine area of Brighton.



8. Sea Life Brighton

Dating from 1872, the oldest operating aquarium in the world. Over 5,000 marine creatures on display. Explore rockpools,; visit the interactive Conservation Cove and step into the Seahorse Nursery.



10. Undercliff Walk

The 3 mile Walk, below the chalk cliffs, runs from the Brighton Marina to the Brighton & Hove City boundary at Saltdean marked by the last rock groyne. A further short section beyond lies the neighboring Lewes District Council area.
