


Bristol

1. Arnos Vale Cemetery

Opened in 1839. Step into a secret world and discover a unique heritage site in the heart of Bristol, as you enter 45 acres of spectacular Victorian Garden Cemetery. Walk around the site on our discovery trail and learn about the diverse history and landscape.



2. Bristol Cathedral

Dating from the 12th century, this is one of England's great medieval churches. One of the finest examples of a "Hall Church" worldwide. With all the vaulted ceiling at the same height. Originally an Augustinian monastery it survived Henry VIII Dissolution and became one of the "New Foundation".



3. Bristol City Docks

A major port since Roman times. With one of the greatest tidal ranges in Europe, it limited shipping access so in 1905 a floating harbor was built which remained in use until 1975. The docks are now a leisure and dining area.



4. Bristol Museum & Art Gallery

This free museum includes sections on natural history and archaeology. The art gallery contains works from all periods, including many by internationally famous artists, as well a collection of modern paintings of Bristol.



5. Cabot Tower

Set in the gorgeous parkland of Brandon Hill near Park Street in the West End, is a 105ft tower built in 1897 to commemorate John Cabot's famous voyage from Bristol to Newfoundland four hundred years earlier.



6. Clifton Suspension Bridge

Designed by Isambard Kingdom Brunel, in 1835, marks a turning point in the history of engineering and has come to symbolize a city of original thinkers and independent spirit. The Bridge is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.



7. ss Great Britain

Launched in 1843, became a landmark of design in ocean going ships. By combining size, power and innovative technology, Brunel created the ship that changed history. She sailed until 1886 but was returned to Bristol in 1970 to be fully restored



8. St Mary Redcliffe Church

The second-largest parish church in England and the tallest building in Bristol. It is so grand that it is often mistaken it for Bristol Cathedral. The church dates back to the 12th century, but most of St. Mary Redcliffe is the work of 15th-century masons,



9. We The Curious

10. Wills Memorial Building

Opened in 1925, the building houses the University's School of Law & School of Earth Sciences, in addition to hosting graduation ceremonies. Tours go behind the grand facade and experience the splendor of the Great Hall, Council Chamber and ornate libraries.
