1. Caerphilly Castle

The second largest castle in Britain, dating from the 13th century. The massive walls, towers and gatehouses located inside the water defenses cover a total of 30 acres.



2. Cardiff Bay

Europe's largest waterfront development, created by the Cardiff Barrage, enclosing the former dockland area. The area is home to the Senned, the Welsh parliament, and other buildings including the BBC studios and Dr Who Museum, plus the barrage itself.



3. Cardiff Castle

Located at the heart of the capital, within beautiful parklands, the Castle has nearly 2,000 years of history just waiting to be explored. Work was begun by the Romans and completed in the 15th century



4. Castell Coch

Castell Coch, or the 'Red Castle', rises up from the ancient beech woods of Fforest Fawr like a vision from a fairy tale. Yet these great towers with their unmistakable conical roofs only hint at the splendor within.



5. Llandaff Cathedral

Stands on one of the oldest Christian sites in Britain. In the sixth century St Dyfrig founded a community close to the ford where the Roman road crossed the river Taff. He was succeeded by St Teilo and then his nephew, St Euddogwy.



6. Millennium Center

The Wales Centre is one of the most unique and lively performing arts centers in Europe. Look beyond the amazing exterior, as featured in Torchwood and Dr Who, and you will come across a bustling atmosphere that makes our visitors want to return again.



7. National Museum Cardiff

The museum is part of the wider network of Amgueddfa Cymru – National Museum Wales. Entry is kept free by a grant from the Welsh Government; however, they do ask for donations throughout the museum.



8. Principality Stadium

The national stadium of Wales, built in 2000 and named in 2016. It is the home of the Wales national rugby union team and has also held Wales national soccer team games.



9. Roath Park

Stands in a beautiful location at the center of the city - a stunning sight by day and night. The park retains the classic Victorian atmosphere where local inhabitants and visitors alike can enjoy their leisure time in many different pursuits.



10. St Fagans National Museum of History

Commonly referred to as St Fagans after the village location, is an open-air museum chronicling the historical lifestyle, culture, and architecture of the Welsh people. The museum is part of the wider network of Amgueddfa Cymru.
