

Paris

One of the most beautiful cities in the world. Home to historical monuments such as Notre Dame, the Eiffel tower (1059 feet), Bastille, Louvre and many more. Much of the city was re-designed by Haussmann in the 19th century. Paris has a population of more than 2 million people, and the city is divided into 20 "arrondissements". The river Seine divides the city into the *Rive Gauche* on the south and the *Rive Droite* on the north banks of the river.

1. Arc de Triomphe

Ordered by Napoleon and opened in 1836, this National monument is located in the center of l'Etoile at the western end of the Champs-Elysees.



2. The Catacombs

60 feet underground in a maze of galleries, visitors will discover an ossuary containing the remains of several million Parisians. This unique site recalls the history of these Parisians and invites visitors to take a timeless journey.



3. Eiffel Tower

Discover the Eiffel Tower: the only trip to the top of its kind in Europe. From the esplanade to the summit you will soak in the breathtakingly unique views of Paris from every floor, walk the glass floor on the 1st floor, experience the incredible ascent by stairway or lift, and vertigogrips you as you leave the lift at the top of the tower and see the people down on the Champs-de-Mars and the cars driving along Trocadéro!



4. Louvre Museum

Originally a royal palace, a must-visit for anyone with a slight interest in art. Some of the museum's most celebrated works of art include the Mona Lisa and the Venus of Milo. One of the largest and most important museums in the world.



5. Moulin Rouge

Every evening, since 1889, a fantasy world bursts onto the stage: 1000 costumes shimmering with feathers, rhinestones and sequins, sensational performances, sumptuous sets and original French music. An iconic Parisian evening entertainment.



6. Notre Dame Cathedral

Built between 1163 to 1250 is the most famous of Gothic Cathedrals, distinguished for its size, antiquity and architecture.



7. Orsay Museum

On the banks of the Seine & opened in 1900 inside the former Orsay railway station, the building was the "first work of art" of the museum! It houses art collections for the period 1848 to 1914.



8. Picasso Museum

Is replete with several thousand of the paintings and sculptures by Pablo Picasso, donated by his family and heirs since 1973.



9. Rodin Museum

Contains the largest collection of the sculptor's works at two sites, in Paris. Created in 1916, thanks to Auguste Rodin's donation of his works and his collections to the French State, it opened in 1919.



10. Sacre Couer

The second highest building in Paris commands views over the city. The Romano-Byzantine structure was built between 1875 and 1914 in white limestone and gold leaf mosaics inside.
