



Reims— Grand Est

Founded by the Romans over 2000 years ago, the city was the coronation city of 33 French Kings for 1000 years. The center of the champagne, area there is a network of 75 miles of champagne cellars beneath the city. 80% of the city was destroyed during the Great War and the Nazi surrender on May 1945 was signed in Reims. There are 4 UNESCO World Heritage Sites in the city: Notre-Dame Cathedral, St-Remi Basilica, Tau Place and St-Remi Abbey Museum.

1. Basilique Saint-Remi

A Unesco World Heritage site founded in the 11th century, is the largest Romanesque church in northern France. A collection of 12th century stained glass.



2. Cathedrale Notre-Dame de Reims

A World Heritage site, featuring over 2000 13th century statues, including the famous "Smiling Angel". Home to a museum and the tomb of St Remi.



3. Champagne Pommery

4. Champagne Taittinger

Demonstrating the art of champagne production is a source of great pride for those involved in its production. Taittinger opens its doors throughout the year to its cellars.



5. Circuit de Reims Gueux

The pit building and grandstands of the original French Grand Prix circuit are still standing along the public road as a motorsport memorial to a bygone era.



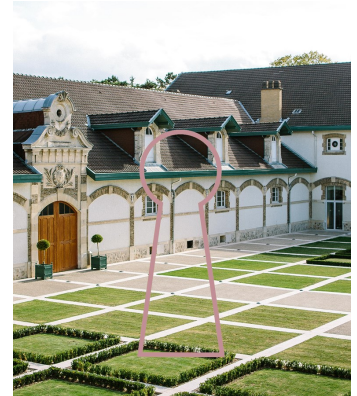
6. La Maison Mumm

7. Maison Ruinart

The House of Ruinart is unlike any other. It was the first established House of Champagne in 1729 and inspired by the intuition of a monk well ahead of his time.



8. Museum of the Surrender

Dedicated to the signing of the surrender of the 3rd Reich to allied forces at General Eisenhower's headquarters on May 07, 1945.



9. Palais de Tau

The former palace of the Archbishop of Reims and home to the kings of France during their coronation. A UNESCO World Heritage site dating from the 12th century.



10. Veuve Cliquot Ponsardin

Founded in 1772 and established as a leading champagne house by the Widow Cliquot in 1805, making the first vintage in 1810, using methods later adopted by other houses.
