
Glasgow

1. The Burrell Collection

Displays objects from Europe and Asia representing five millennia of art and history. The focus



is on late medieval and early Renaissance Europe but the collection also contains important examples of Chinese art.

3. Glasgow Cathedral

St Mungo's Cathedral is the oldest cathedral on mainland Scotland and is the oldest building in Glasgow. Since the Reformation the cathedral continues in public ownership, within the responsibility of Historic Environment Scotland.



5. Glasgow Science Centre

One of Scotland's must-see visitor attractions. It has lots of activities to keep visitors of all ages entertained for hours. There are two acres of interactive exhibits, workshops, shows, activities, a planetarium and an IMAX cinema.



7. Peoples Palace

The city's social history, since 1750 can be explored through a wealth of historic artifacts, paintings, prints and photographs, film and interactive computer displays. The exhibits give a wonderful insight into how Glaswegians lived, worked and played



9. Riverside Museum

Glasgow's award-winning transport museum. With over 3,000 objects on display there's everything from skateboards to locomotives, paintings to prams and cars to a Stormtrooper.



2. Gallery of Modern Art

A world class art museum and a place for people to gather, to learn and to share ideas. We display, borrow and collect artworks from around the world



4. Glasgow City Chambers

Completed in 1888, over-looking George Square, is one of the city's most prestigious buildings. Open Monday to Friday 8.30am to 5pm. This grand edifice is a symbol of Glasgow's historic wealth and has, for more than a century, been the



headquarters of successive councils serving the City of Glasgow

6. Kelvingrove Art Gallery & Museum

Opened in 1901 with stunning architecture and a family friendly atmosphere. Explore 22 galleries and discover everything from art to annimals and Charles Rennie Mackintosh. A must see venue!



8. Provand's Lordship

Built in 1471, is one of only four surviving medieval buildings in Glasgow. The "auld hoose" is furnished with a fine selection of 17th century historic furniture and royal portraits. Step back into medieval Glasgow with a visit to this fascinating building.



10. University of Glasgow—Hunterian Museum

Founded in 1807, The Hunterian is one of the leading university museums in the UK and is one of Scotland's most important cultural assets. The collections include scientific instruments used by James Watt, Joseph Lister and Lord Kelvin.
