## "The Home of Golf"

With 30 golf courses within 15 miles, 6 inside the boundaries of the "Auld Gray Toun", it certainly lives up to its reputation. In addition it is home to Scotland's oldest University, founded in 1413; the ruins of the Cathedral date from the 700s and remain a distinctive landmark; the castle ruins present a turbulent and violent history.

The closest railway station to St Andrews is 5 miles away at Leuchars Junction on the main East Coast railway line from Edinburgh to Aberdeen. Regular bus services operate from both Edinburgh and Dundee. For golfers a self drive SUV, from either Glasgow or Edinburgh Airports is suggested

**Falkland Palace** King James IV and James V, commissioned craftsmen to create a 'pleasure palace' for their beloved country pursuits of falconry and hunting. The end result was Falkland, one of Scotland's finest Renaissance palaces. The Stuart kings were frequent residents here and Mary, Queen of Scots adored Falkland,

as it reminded her of the chateaux of the French Royal Court where she grew up.



**Scottish Deer Centre** Covering over 55 acres of countryside, the center is home to fourteen species of deer from all over the world, Fife's only wolf pack,

otters and other rare breeds including the Scottish Wildcat. You can also come face to face with some amazing birds in the Raptor World Bird of Prey Centre.



**St Andrews Castle** Explore a castle caught in the Protestant Reformation struggle for hearts and minds. St Andrews Castle was a bishop's palace, a fortress and a state prison during its 450-year history. Descend into the castle's unique underground mine and countermine to

get a sense of medieval siege warfare. Peer into the bottle dungeon – one of medieval Britain's most infamous castle prisons



**Crail Harbour** is in a historic fishing village in the East Neuk of Fife. Charming cobbled streets tumble down to the miniature harbor, which is sheltered by cliffs and sur-

rounded by historic fishing cottages. There is plenty to explore including a heritage center, galleries, local shops and eateries.



**Kellie Castle** Medieval atmosphere meets Victorian style at Kellie Castle. The oldest parts date back to the 14th century, but the whole interior was overhauled in the late 19th century by famous artistic family the Lorimers. Outside, take a wander through the Arts & Crafts

garden with its magnificent herbaceous borders.



**Scottish Fisheries Museum** Situated in a wonderful collection of historic buildings on the harbor of a small and beautiful fishing port, the principal aim, in all of our efforts is to excite informed interest in the development

of the Scottish commercial fishing industry among people of all ages in and beyond Scotland.



**St Andrews Cathedral** Explore the remains of Scotland's largest and most magnificent medieval church. Even in its ruinous state, the cathedral remains a prominent landmark highly visible from the sea. Find out how

the cathedral dominated Scottish religion until 1560, as headquarters of the medieval Scottish Church.
